Joseph Mohr was an illegitimate child who saw his share of personal struggles growing up. As a young man in Austria, all he could ever remember was war. Napoleon and his armies advanced across Europe, leaving behind hunger, devastation, and hopelessness. Joseph had a love of music and learned to play the guitar. He perceived that God was calling him to ministry, and his obedience to that call led him to become a priest. He was assigned to a small, struggling congregation in the village of Mariapar.

On a cool, peaceful starlit night in 1816, he was walking through the quiet village. He was inspired to write a six verse German poem entitled "Stille Nacht Heilige Nacht." Two years later on Christmas Eve, he was in Oberndorf. The organ was broken in St. Nicholas parish, and a song was needed for midnight mass. He presented his poem to Franz Gruber, an acquaintance of his. Mr. Gruber wrote a melody for the lyrics in just a couple of hours. Two gifted, faithful men, filled with the Holy Spirit, collaborated to create and perform the carol.

Once the song debuted, it was Spirit driven across the globe. An organ builder and repair man working at the church took a copy to his home village. There, it was picked up and spread by two families of traveling folk singers.
